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What is Vocational Rehabilitation?

- The Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) program helps people with disabilities prepare for, enter, engage in, or advance in competitive employment.
- The program also helps businesses and employers recruit, retain and accommodate employees with disabilities.

VR Customers consist of:

• Adults with disabilities

• Youth and students with disabilities

• Businesses and employers

VR Service Delivery Structure

- Teams are led by a counselor and include:
- Rehabilitation Assistants
- VR Teachers
- Employment Assistance Specialists
- Deaf/Blind Specialists
- Vocational Diagnostic Unit
- Assistive Technology Unit
- Community Rehabilitation Programs (CRPs)
- Business Relations Coordinators
- Medical Service Coordinators


Vocational Rehabilitation Counselors

Counselors have significant responsibilities in VR including:

- Determining eligibility
- Providing counseling and guidance
- Understanding disabilities and what the possibilities for employment
- Knowing the community resources that are available
- Understanding barriers to employment and how to mitigate them
- Developing the Individualized Plan for Employment (IPE) which is a shared responsibility between the customer and the counselor
- Understanding local and state Labor Markets



TheVR Process



Eligibility Criterion

- The Individual must have a disability (physical, mental, emotional, or sensory).
- 2) The disability has to result in a substantial impediment to employment.
- 3) The individual must require VR services to prepare for, enter, engage in, or advance in competitive employment.
- 4) The individual must be presumed able to achieve competitive employment.

Vocational Rehabilitation Services

- VR is eligibility-based.
- Income is not a factor for eligibility, but may be considered for cost of certain services.
- We are not an emergency services provider.
- Our services are not intended to be long-term, but there is no cut off. If we know a person will need supports at work long term, we will work with them to make sure they are arranged.

What services can we provide?

TWS-VRS (Texas Workforce Solutions – Vocational Rehabilitation Services) can provide almost any service necessary to help an individual with a disability **go to work**. Services are considered on an individual basis and must be <u>reasonable and necessary</u> for that person.

Vocational Rehabilitation Services

Each individual is unique based on their vocational goal, transferrable skills, schooling, work experience, and disability.

- Counseling & Guidance
- Employment Assistance
- Job Coaching
- On The Job Training
- Job Readiness Training
- Mobility Training (i.e. O&M)
- Job Accommodations
- Vocational Training

- Tools and Equipment
- Vehicle/Job site/Home modifications

Vocational Rehabilitation Services Cont.

- Evaluations and assessments
- Treatment and/or therapy to lessen or remove barriers to employment
- Training to learn job skills and appropriate work behaviors
- Rehabilitation technology devices/services to improve job functioning
- Job placement assistance and supported employment services
- Job retention services
- Follow-up after job placement to ensure job success
- Assistance with developing a small business or self-employment

What is Vocational Rehabilitation?

Before Rehabilitation

- I hurt my back and can't do my job.
- I am going to lose my job because I can't hear well anymore.
- I have cerebral palsy and am unable to speak.
- How can I go somewhere I've never been or seen?
- I can't work because I'm blind.
- I can't do what "normal" people can do.

After Rehabilitation

- After surgery and rehab, I can return to work.
- With my new hearing aids, I can now perform my job effectively.
- Now I can communicate using my communication device.
 - I can go where I want and need to go.
- I can have a career.
- I can be whatever I decide to be.

Transition Services

- The goal is to identify and begin working with students before they graduate so there isn't a delay in supports once they leave school
- VR can begin working with students as early as 14 years old.
- We work alongside the schools to help support and enhance the services they already provide in order to better prepare the student for life beyond high school
- Each High School has either a Transition Counselor or a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor assigned

Special Population Groups

- Deaf and Hard of Hearing
- Autism Spectrum Disorders
- Veterans
- Transition aged
- Blind or Visually Impaired

Medical Services

- Federal law requires that medical services (including corrective surgery or treatment) that are sponsored or supported by Vocational Rehabilitation Services (VR) must:
 - have a direct effect on the customer's functional ability to perform the employment goal or the services must support other needed vocational rehabilitation services; and
 - be likely, within a reasonable period, to correct or modify substantially a stable or slowly progressive physical or mental impairment that constitutes a substantial impediment to employment.

The following medical services are not authorized:

- ongoing general medical care for health maintenance;
- emerging technology and temporary, experimental, or investigational medical services
- maternity care; and
- medical or surgical treatment associated with:
 - active tuberculosis;
 - sexually transmitted diseases;
 - cancer;
 - organ transplantation (except for the treatment of individuals with end-stage renal disease, subject to management review and approval, as set out below); or
 - human immunodeficiency virus infection (HIV) or acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS).

Successful Case Closure

- The individual has been able to achieve the employment outcome that was described on the IPE (Individual Plan for Employment) for at least 90 days.
- The job is consistent with their strengths, resources, priorities, concerns, abilities, capabilities, interests and informed choice.
- No additional services are necessary and the consumer and employer are satisfied with the outcome.
